

Assessments

Reading assessments will consist of tests, quizzes, discussions, and exit slips. If a student is absent, they are responsible for setting up a time with the teacher to make up the assessment. This will usually be during focus time so that the student doesn't miss any class work. Cheating is taken very seriously. If a student is caught cheating, they will receive a zero for the assessment.

Notebooks

The Three Subject Notebook- Every student should have a three subject notebook for reading. In the first section the students will complete their daily work. The second section will be for any classwork/homework that is to be done on paper. The last section is your child's glossary. For each lesson there are vocabulary words that we focus on as well as other words that a student might be confused about. These words and definitions should be copied into your child's glossary.

The students will also have a **literature circle notebook** (can be left at home until meeting days) where they will complete all of their work in relation to the novel that they are reading.

The students will also have a Reader's Response notebook that they can keep at home until Friday. They will read a text that they select, and write a thoughtful response about the book. They will have four entries per week, and these will be collected and graded on Friday.

HOMEWORK

Work not completed and turned in **by the assigned date** is considered late. If a student is absent on the date work is due, the assignment is due the first day the student returns to school. If they missed an in class activity, the student should visit the "We Missed You" folder and retrieve any missed work.

COMPLETED LATE WORK will only receive partial credit and will not be accepted after three days. **INCOMPLETE LATE WORK** will not be graded and will result in a zero for the assignment.

Think Sheets

A Think Sheet will be sent home if a student forgets their homework, is misbehaving, or is unprepared for class. This sheet should be signed by the parent and returned the following day. If the student behavior is serious, they might have an immediate lunch detention or referral.

- 1. <u>Warning</u>: the teacher provides a verbal reprimand/reminder. (three strikes in most cases)
- 2. <u>Lunch Detention</u>: short time spent during lunch to contemplate conduct.
- 3. <u>Referral to Administration</u>: a cadet will be immediately referred to administration for severe behavior problems.
